It has taken several years to create plans for our key projects; longer than I expected. When we started this campaign in 2017, we targeted 6 key projects to renew Ann Morrison’s lovely park: construct an off-leash swim area, upgrade the fountain, create safe pedestrian and bike access from Crescent Rim, relocate and restore the clock, improve entryway signage, and revamp the rafter takeout area. Thanks to donations from Together Treasure Valley and the City of Boise, Dog Island was completed in July of 2019. But like almost everything else in our society, COVID delayed fundraising. Finally—I am happy to report—we are going again! It is my plan to write a quarterly newsletter that will share our vision and keep you informed.
